FROM THE PRESIDENT Brian L. King

What a year it has been! Like a lot of people, I'm just wishing for 2020 to fast forward to 2021. It's hard to believe the things our country has dealt with this year.

Thank you to all who have helped us get through the Coronavirus pandemic up to this point. You will read about many businesses and people who helped us since March to make it through this unusual time. COVID-19 has had an impact on TCH statewide. The number of youth referred to our programs decreased due to the court system being temporarily closed and our reluctance to accept any who may have symptoms. We have been blessed to not have any children test positive for the virus at the writing of this article.

The upcoming year is an exciting time for Tennessee Children's Home. God has blessed this work for 111 years and Lord willing, we will be able to continue to make an impact for the cause of Christ on those we serve for many more years to come. Since 1990 over 1,300 have obeyed the Gospel—to this we give God the glory.

Our program at North Central moves to Clarksville at the end of October 2020. We will continue to serve displaced families and young adults aging out of the foster care system at our two apartments. We are grateful to Steve Church for helping us get the program started in Clarksville.

The new Spring Hill campus is in the building process about 3 miles from our current campus. We appreciate SR Residential for allowing us to stay on campus until December 2021 until the new campus is complete. Our needs at TCH have not changed since COVID-19, but our plans have slowed down. Our "Building the Future' campaign was to begin earlier this year but was delayed because of the restrictions of the pandemic. We would like to challenge the churches of Christ within the counties to raise enough money to build the six group homes, which is estimated to be about \$750,000 per house. We still need to raise about 25% of the projected cost to complete the buildings and fully furnish the houses with new furniture and appliances.

OUR MISSION

Tennessee Children's Home is committed to improving the lives of those we influence through quality services in a Christian atmosphere.

OUR VISION

Those served by Tennessee Children's Home will learn to live healthy physical, mental, social, and Christian lives.

WHAT WE DO

Tennessee Children's Home provides group home residential treatment, child and family counseling, and independent living programs. The purpose of TCH is to support, educate and provide Christian out-of-home care for children who are victims of abuse, dependent neglected, orphaned, and/or exploited, making all reasonable and practical efforts to provide services to meet their intellectual, emotional, physical and spiritual needs. A further purpose is to provide family intervention that is intended to prevent or reverse family disintegration through a series of community based and family based intervention strategies.

With four campuses located across the state, Tennessee Children's Home is able to offer a variety of services to children and their families. These include residential care for children placed by the Department of Children's Services and classified as needing Level II services. TCH also offers Alcohol and Drug programs. The group home residences are family oriented-serving no more than 8 children per house under the guidance of Christian house parents. Each campus offers supervised recreational facilities such as gymnasiums, softball fields, volleyball, exercise and weight-lifting equipment, games rooms, and other activities.

All the children in our care, regardless of the program, receive professional counseling. For some privately placed children, those classified as Level II, TCH offers on-campus and highly structured, therapeutic educational facilities. TCH also provides a minimum 3-month monitoring program to assist children and their families in the transition back into home, school, and work environments.

OUR PROGRAM

The Level II residential care program is designed for children who may be abused or neglected and who may exhibit runaway or delinquent behavior. They may have problems with their families, local law enforcement, school environments, or with their own personal behavior. The children served are between 13 and 18 years old. The children receive individual and group counseling, assistance with individual problems, and behavior modification instruction designed to help them become responsible adults. They live in group homes designed to be as family integrated as possible.

The Cornerstone School in Spring Hill, Duncan Academy in Knoxville, and New Heights in Pinson are the on-campus schools that provide for the educational needs of children in Level II programs and private placements. Most of these children are academically behind and/or have special learning needs. The school offers a structured and treatment-oriented environment, a 6:1 student-teacher ratio, tutoring, and special education classes. Students take courses in Math, Science, English, Reading, Life Skills, Physical Education, and Bible.

As Tennessee Children's Home works with abused, neglected, wayward, and orphaned children and youth, all reasonable and practical efforts are made to provide services to meet their intellectual, emotional, physical, and spiritual needs. This program has already proven successful as we observe the changes in student's behavior. The children become more self-confident, have less personal behavioral problems and are more productive as members of their community. We are providing the highest quality program promising the overall growth and success of each child in our care. •

To say that we are excited about our *Building the Future* initiative would be an understatement. Anytime we get to improve the way we serve kids is an opportunity we know is a blessing from God. Whether it be to improve a service we provide, gain experienced staff who love kids and are invested in obtaining the best outcomes for those we serve, or, as in this case, we get to provide better facilities to continue the legacy of great Christian service to young people in need.

In the same way, to say we are anxious would be accurate as well. As you are likely aware we have been involved in capital projects on each of our campuses. In Clarksville, we are trying to obtain a grant to help us with the purchase of the apartments we are currently using to serve our independent living residents. In Henderson, we just paused our renovations to 4 campus buildings that began at the end of 2019. We plan to call the completed items

Phase 1. We hope to get back and start Phase 2 in the near future. In Knoxville, we have had a renovation planned for our Cherrybrook house for many years now. We have raised about 70% of that project and plan to begin that no later than early fall. Finally, in Spring Hill, we sold our current property and must be off of it by December of 2021. This is by far our largest project which will be underway by the printing of this newsletter.

If we had it our way, we would not have jumped into all of these projects at the same time. What's more, had we known what 2020 was going to look like, we would have not taken on such big endeavors. We know that the way the timing worked out for us is the Lord's timing. It has provided many challenges for us to work through. It has provided many opportunities for us to get better acquainted with the very individuals and churches that keep us going financially. But, most importantly


it has compelled us to approach our God in prayer for this work in a more fervent manner. We know that without God, none of the work we do would be possible (Philippians 4:13).

MY TIME AT TCH Jonathon- age 17



The young adults in the Tennessee Children's Home Independent Living Program can't avoid the twists and turns of life, but they can cast a vision for the direction they want to go. There are many goals to meet along the way. Tennessee Children's Home is trying to help these young adults learn skills which will hopefully help them become the person they want to be and accomplish independence.

Nine young ladies who were 18 have been served in this program since it began in November 2018. Tennessee Children's Home is helping these young adults set their course in life by teaching life skills.

Currently, there are two young ladies in the program. They both have jobs and plan to attend college in the fall. These young adults lack many skills such as how to organize and keep an apartment clean, how to budget and save money, grocery shop, apply for jobs, meal preparation, and many other independent living skills. The apartments are in Clarksville, Tennessee and are easily accessible to a bus stop, medical facilities, and grocery stores.

Many of the young adults have chosen to leave the Independent Living Program for various reasons. Our hope and prayer are that Tennessee Children's Home can help these young adults not only set their course for success, but to help them achieve it. ●





Become a part of this vital ministry! Tennessee Children's Home offers competitive pay and excellent full-time benefits including medical, dental, vision, life insurance, disability, retirement, and paid-time off.

Licensed Therapist: *TCH-East (Knoxville)* is seeking an individual to provide counseling to high-risk youth who are experiencing difficulties with peers, family, and community. The Counselor will conduct structured groups, individual and family counseling on a continuing basis to address treatment goals as determined by intake assessment. Position requires a Master's degree in counseling, social work, or directly related field. License is preferred but will work with individual who is seeking licensure.

Night Staff: (*Spring Hill & Knoxville*) is seeking at least one full-time and one part-time night staff to supervise youth during sleep hours of 10:00 PM-6:00 AM. High School diploma or GED equivalent required, at least 21 years of age, prefer someone with experience working with youth.

Residential Counselors: *West (Henderson)* is seeking two (2) full-time Residential Counselor Couples (formerly houseparents) to be responsible for the day-to-day care, guidance, and training of the youth assigned to residence, all in keeping with the program policies and procedures. Must have a minimum of a high school diploma or GED, advanced education preferred and one-year experience working with children and youth.

Teacher: *TCH Middle (Spring Hill)* is seeking one full-time teacher for their on-site school. Will work closely with all TCH staff in keeping with a team approach to meet the needs of students. Will plan, organize and implement an appropriate instructional program in a learning environment that guides and encourages students to develop and fulfill their academic potential. Must hold a Bachelors' degree or higher from an accredited institution. Meet professional teacher education requirements of school, district, and state and be state certified.

What is considered an *In-Kind gift?* In-Kind gifts are charitable giving in which—instead of giving money to buy needed goods and services—the goods and services themselves are given.
